











International Parliamentarians' Forum on ICPD 30:

Sustainable Water Resources and Demographic Resilience for the Interest of Youth



10-11 June 2024 Dushanbe, Tajikistan

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Forum Summary

Lawmakers face an increasingly complex world in which to deliver on their mandates. Emerging megatrends continue to reshape societies in complex ways, making a rigorous legislative process all the more important for effective, evidence-based action. Given the often regional or global scope of the challenges, inter-parliamentary dialogue is not only natural, but an essential tool for identifying sustainable policy solutions.

In that spirit, more than 450 participants from 15 countries gathered in Dushanbe, Tajikistan from June 10-11, 2024 to advance dialogue on environmental and demographic issues in Asia and Eastern Europe. In this unique forum, parliamentarians, dignitaries, representatives from international organizations, and experts shared their experiences, exchanged ideas, and helped reinforce a living network for dialogue.

The forum was part of an ongoing series made possible by the generous support of the Japan Trust Fund, a reliable partner with AFPPD for over 24 years. The warm reception and mobilization of resources by the forum's hosts, the Majlisi Namoyandagon of the Majlisi Oli (Parliament) of Tajikistan, similarly sent a clear signal of the priority and value assigned to the issues at hand.

Thematic Coverage

The common thread running throughout the forum was the utilization of both natural and human resources to their fullest potential. Discussion of these themes repeatedly underscored how conservation of natural resources and human capital are tightly interrelated, affecting society's capacity for development, mitigating and adapting to environmental change, and providing conditions for a high quality of life.

The themes of the four substantive sessions explicitly identified young people and women as important subpopulations requiring policy attention for the specific challenges they face. Besides representing a meaningful goal in its own right, creating conditions for young people and women to thrive can also activate significant untapped capacity for the overall economic development and welfare of nations.

Forum Inspiration

A major milestone in global population policy discourse served as the inspiration for this forum, lending its name to the event. ICPD30 was the recent gathering of governments, marking the 30-year anniversary and reaffirming the principles laid out in the 1994 Cairo meeting of the International Conference on

Population and Development. The landmark event saw 179 governments make commitments to a rights-based, human-centric approach to population policy via the Programme of Action. While demographic trends and human capital increasingly grab the attention of policy-makers, addressing the challenges with right-based measures remains the standard by which solutions can be found. The forum carried forward such approaches to meet demographic needs, regardless of where in the *Demographic Transition* a country finds itself.

The Parliamentarians' forum was also inspired by and tied to the 3rd Dushanbe Water Conference, a gathering aimed at promoting sustainable use of water resources. Tajikistan, as a water-rich nation, has become a champion of such issues after hosting multiple international water-related initiatives and domestic legislative actions. Maintaining water security – with all its economic, social, and demographic implications – is increasingly recognized as in the collective interest of Central Asia. At a global level, Tajikistan and the UN have recently brought more awareness to water security and the high stakes involved, declaring 2025 as the International Year of Glaciers' Preservation and setting March 21st as an annual World Day for Glaciers. The forum incorporated such themes since they directly connect to long-standing commitments to further the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and access to water is essentially a precondition to achieving any of the other SDGs.

Visibility & Impact

While the forum will have ripple effects that continue to be felt, it already has produced a concrete outcome in the form of a joint declaration, a call to action for the attendees. The forum concluded with the adoption of a statement on 12 priorities as well as a pledge for participants to pursue in their respective parliaments. The pledge called for advancing legislative action to advance resilience amid demographic and environmental change.

The forum's success went beyond the event itself, garnering media attention and influencing the outcome document of the 3rd High-Level Water Conference, a major gathering held in the proceeding days. Specifically, the document called for 1) empowerment of women and girls, 2) role of parliamentarians and youth, and 3) ensuring policies with participation of women and youth – all of which were key messages from the forum.

Substantive Sessions: Overview and Takeaways

The forum was organized into four substantive sessions (see Appendix 1 for the detailed program), covering the overarching theme of sustainably cultivating natural resources and human potential, from different perspectives. The following synthesizes the four sessions' speeches and discussions, which were held in Tajik, English, and Russian.

Session 1 | Regional Perspectives on ICPD30 and Climate Change

The first session began with a regional overview of demographic, social, and environmental trends. Across the UNECE region, later childbearing and declining fertility rates were said to be the new norm. At the same time, reproductive health and the reconciliation of work and family responsibilities pose ongoing issues. Amid such complex demographic shifts, climate change was identified as a multiplier of existing challenges. Already exceeding projections, the session heard how average temperatures may reach 1.5 degrees (above the pre-industrial average) in the near-future, and 2.5-to-3 degrees by the end of the century – surpassing critical thresholds. Such thresholds come with visible impacts on natural systems, and by extension, economic activity.

Throughout the session, the intergenerational aspect of climate change was repeatedly touched upon. Specifically, speakers noted that today's youth will bare an oversized burden of the impacts and therefore, should be actively brought into conversations about mitigation and adaptation. For example, the Y-PEER program does this, with experience showing that localized, nuanced programs are essential to address environmental and youth-issues. Additionally, successful youth-led initiatives cannot solely rely on the volunteering model as a substitute for workers, otherwise young people are put at risk of burnout and being stretched too thin between studies, work, and other commitments.

Country Example: Tajikistan | National Strategy on Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) 2019-2034

In accordance with the UN framework, Tajikistan has adopted its DDR strategy with the main objectives:

1) reduce the number of deaths and injuries from natural disasters, 2) inform stakeholders, 3) integrate disaster management into ongoing development, and 4) improve response mechanisms. In a shift, the policy has transformed its approach from reactive to proactive, as well as integrated the private sector into the policy-making process.

Looking ahead, the COP29 conference, to be hosted by Azerbaijan Nov 11-22 (2024), was highlighted as a critical venue for advancing environmentally conscious policy. It was even called the single most important event of 2024. Parliamentarians were therefore encouraged to use the forum as an occasion to show leadership in sustainable utilization of natural resources and make ambitious plans for the months leading up to COP29.

Key Takeaways

Session 2 | Harnessing the Power of Youth: Addressing Megatrends and Shaping Demographic Resilience in the Region

Building on themes introduced in Session 1, youth were put at the center of Session 2. Throughout the session, speakers repeatedly drew a connection between youth, creativity, and challenging the status quo. They argued that young people have a longer time horizon than older cohorts, and a vested interest in the future given that the weight of the impacts will be felt in their personal lives, spurring on a greater predisposition for action.

The session also covered an important sub-group of young people who receive much policy attention, namely, NEETs – those 'Not in Education, Employment, or Training'. Generally, it was agreed that NEETs represent a target group, which can be further brought into productive activities. The participants heard how in a very short time (the past 6 years), Uzbekistan has demonstrated an impressive quadrupling of its students enrolled in higher education institutions.

Country Example: Uzbekistan | Strategy for Youth Development

Five initiatives are being implemented for cultivating youth potential. These include promoting the following: 1) training in the arts, 2) physical health with sports, 3) technological skills, 4) spirituality and knowledge (esp. reading), and 5) the employment of women. Such a comprehensive approach to policy recognizes the social, economic, and cultural value that young people can contribute to society.

Midway through the session, the participants watched a video clip from the recent Global Youth Dialogue event in Cotonou, Benin. Some of the speakers present had attended the summit and held it up as an example of providing opportunities for young people to gain experience in discussing pressing issues. One of the primary desires of the participants was to be able to directly give input and share their perspectives in decision-making bodies, including parliaments.

Multiple speakers touched on the recurring challenge of 'brain drain', or the loss of human capital. In Eastern Europe, many of the youth have gone to Western Europe and in Central Asia many to Russia, representing lost investments in education for the home countries. However, trends of returning Bosnians (especially workers in the IT industry) were highlighted. While the scope and longevity of the reversal is subject to change, this demonstrates that it is possible for high out-migration countries to see a return of professionals from the diaspora and a better retention of talent. An open question was posed for parliamentarians to consider: is your education system preparing today's youth for jobs in the next 5-10 years?

Country Example: Georgia | Parliament Actions to Strengthen Internships for Youth

To address disconnects between education and the labor market, the Georgian parliament has strengthened opportunities for young people by obliging state institutions to offer internships, which will benefit young Georgians by ensuring the positions 1) provide income, 2) offer practical experience, and 3) come with formal recognition of public service by the state. Internships in deficient professions – subject to annual review – are further incentivized with double the pay.

Overall, Session 2 concluded that the common objective to aim for is the creation of stable and high-quality socio-cultural structures to keep young people engaged. Furthermore, jobs and education for young people should be integrated to a greater extent, rather than treating the two as separate activities from a policy-making standpoint. Offering youth appeal prospects for launching their lives as adults was said to be essential for reducing brain drain, and more generally, strengthen the fabric of society.

Session 3 | Empowering Women for Resilient Societies: Bridging Gaps, Breaking Norms

The challenges and key disparities faced by women were the focus of Session 3. The speakers covered issues ranging from employment to safety, and how gender-responsive policy-making could help identify and address structural barriers faced by women.

In accordance with the session's objectives, the speakers raised concerns over the amount of unpaid work, specifically in the form of care burdens, that fall disproportionately on women. Across the presentations estimates of 2 to 2.5 times as much unpaid work were given, establishing a general pattern common across countries where women are often tasked with caring for children and parents in old age, as well as being formally employed at the same time. In Bosnia and Herzegovina (BiH) for example, the unpaid work amounted to 6 hours per day. In the EU, with its different cultural expectations of family and economic conditions, women nevertheless have an average is 3.5 hours of unpaid work per day. Parliamentarians were called upon to encourage the sharing of such duties within families and to incentivize the creation of affordable, quality infrastructure solutions for child and elderly care.

Paid maternity leave from work, and the security it brings, remains unattainable for women in many countries. However, more countries are providing support, such as Turkmenistan, which now provides job security and pay to mothers until the child reaches age 3. Removing barriers for women to enter the labor

market (or re-enter after having children) was highlighted as not only in their interest, but also that of the broader economy.

Country Example: Bosnia and Herzegovina | Training Unemployed Mothers

In BiH, DM Drogerie Markt (in partnership with UNFPA, the Mozaik Foundation, and the Czech Government) established a program to help unemployed mothers gain practical skills, with paid work experience and flexible schedules – allowing them to more easily combine work with motherly duties. This project was cited as proof of concept, a model for demonstrating the benefits of companies offering greater flexibility.

The forum's hosts highlighted that Tajikistan is taking active steps to elevate the role of women in society. In keeping with the ratification of various key conventions, the country has a goal of women comprising 30% of civil servants, 25% of political leaders by 2030. Furthermore, fighting sexual harassment has been a particularly high priority, prompting the establishment of a clear legal definition, ensuring compliance down to the local levels, and opening 29 domestic violence centers throughout the country.

Other speakers expressed concern for policy action on violence against women. To achieve this, legislation must incentivize serious, competent responses from authorities. Victims should be made comfortable to report crimes and perpetrators brought to justice to achieve lasting change. In addition to the long-standing problem of physical and sexual violence against women, related threats in the digital space are an emerging reality. How to define the crimes and how to enforce the laws were stated as timely questions in need of urgent legislative inquiry.

The session concluded with statements that progress on such measures does not happen by accident, instead it requires conscious steps. The wide range of issues brought up by the speakers – social roles, unemployment, political participation, and protection from violence – underscored how legislative activity has clear direct and indirect effects on women's issues.

Session 4 | The Parliamentarians' Role in Advancing the ICPD and 2030 Agendas

The final session broadened its scope to touch on the ICPD and 2030 agendas, and the various openings for parliamentarians to make progress in their respective countries. Discussions ranged from young to seniors, with the larger goal of creating conditions for all members of society to lead healthy, productive, and fulfilling lives.

The forum heard that, in Armenia, the age that comes with an expanded set of rights was lowered to 12, reflecting an intention to better incorporate youth in society. The country has implemented a package of youth measures to promote civic education, healthy lifestyles, knowledge of one's homeland, professional orientation, volunteering, as well as financial and digital literacy. Such efforts fall within the ICPD and 2030 agendas by offering skills and education that will set up young people for greater self-realization and ability to pursue their aspirations.

At the other end of the age spectrum, the ICPD and SDGs are concerned with the welfare of seniors. The forum heard calls to realize that 'old' is not a useful or simple to define label. Specifically, there is an important distinction between young and old pensioners, the former of which typically require minimal or no support and can still actively contribute to their communities. Pensioners were said to have much to offer both in terms of part-time employment (where legislation and employers do not set up barriers), as well as for their volunteering in the community.

Country Example: Belarus | Granny's Tales & Silver Job Placement Fairs

In Belarus, a network was established to pair volunteer grandmas with children who have speech disabilities. The grandmas spend time with the children reading stories, which helps improve skill deficits for the children while also fighting the growing problem of loneliness among the elderly. Similarly, 'silver' job placement fairs have been created to target mutually beneficial work arrangements for seniors and employers. Both the volunteering and part-time work provide opportunities for seniors to meaningfully contribute to their communities.

In terms of guiding principles, Session 4 heard that the involvement of stakeholders is a precondition for advancing the ICPD and 2030 agendas. Stronger investments in human capital – in addition to being an explicit development goal in the ICPD and SDGs – was said to also be a force for leveling out some of the

more extreme disparities existing within populations. Lastly, the participants acknowledged that regular inter-parliamentary dialogue – as was being done in the forum – remains crucial for staying on top of best practices to achieve sustainable development.

Key Takeaways

Forum Declaration

As a culmination of the broad policy exchanges in the substantive sessions, the forum moved to make the shared sentiments tangible by producing a joint outcome document. This declaration - calling for 12 points of action — went through a brief round of discussion among the forum's participants, passing with relative ease. The lack of objections or substantial edits to the text reflected the foundational nature of the 'statements of commitment', many of which were intended to reaffirm the core tenants of ICPD30. The final adopted declaration in its entirety is available in Appendix 2, with the complete list of participants in the forum detailed in Appendix 3.

BACKGROUND

The 30-year review of implementation of the International Conference on Population and Development Programme of Action (ICPD30) is underway across several platforms, including a wide cross-section of actors and types of events. In the last 30 years, significant progress has been made, but progress is threatened by multifaceted crises, backsliding on the rights and choices of women and girls, and the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. While there is progressive activism for social justice, climate action and equality, we are at a critical inflection point to preserve the hard-won gains and deliver on the vision of the ICPD agenda and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) — the historic set of goals adopted by world leaders in 2015 to eliminate poverty, achieve gender equality and secure the health and well-being of all people. As we approach the 30th anniversary of the ICPD, there's a chance to revitalize the agenda centered on human rights and sustainable development.

International Parliamentarians' Forum on ICPD30 will explore how at this 30-year anniversary, the core values of the ICPD Programme of Action remain a beacon for advancing sustainable development with a focus on human rights, including reproductive rights, empowerment of women and young people and addressing inequalities. The event will also provide parliamentarians, who are at the very core of the legislative process, with an opportunity to share good practices and advocate for coordinated regional efforts towards achieving the ICPD goals. The meeting will discuss issues related to demographic shifts, gender equality, young people's empowerment, water scarcity and climate change and form a milestone on the way to the UN Climate Change Conference (COP29) in Baku in November 2024.

International Parliamentarians' Forum on ICPD30 will be held at the margins of the <u>Third Dushanbe Water Action Decade Conference</u>, hosted by the Government of the Republic of Tajikistan in cooperation with the United Nations to support the implementation of the goals of the International Decade for Action "Water for Sustainable Development" 2018-2028. The participants of the International Parliamentarians' Forum on ICPD30 will attend the opening ceremony of the Water Action Decade Conference.

OBJECTIVES

- To promote dialogue among parliamentarians, government representatives, civil society, the private sector, and academia from Central Asia and Eastern Europe on the implementation of the ICPD Programme of Action and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) with a view to achieving commitment to collective action in the creation of an enabling policy environment and increasing investments in advancing ICPD agenda implementation.
- To discuss barriers to women's empowerment and gender equality and propose solutions to the realization of women's full potential, including through gender-responsive family policies.
- To discuss the role of young people in the context of demographic resilience in Eastern Europe and Central Asia, and how best to reflect their rights and aspirations in policy and national commitments, including their participation in decision-making fora.
- To leverage on ICPD30 outcomes to strengthen partnerships and advance the UN Water Conference's Water Action Agenda, accelerating progress on 2030 Sustainable Development Agenda.

EXPECTED OUTCOMES

- Statement of Commitment outlining concrete actions to be taken by parliamentarians to prioritize demographic resilience, gender equality, youth empowerment, water security and climate action for achieving both the ICPD agenda and the SDGs.
- Expanded network of parliamentarians championing action towards the implementation of ICPD agenda and achievement of the SDGs.
- Deeper understanding among parliamentarians of the complex interplay between demographic resilience, gender equality, youth empowerment, water scarcity and climate change.

The panel discussion will delve into the critical intersections of gender equality, workforce participation, gender-based violence and demographic resilience. Appendix 2: Declaration

International Parliamentarians' Forum on ICPD30: Sustainable Water Resources and Demographic Resilience for the Interest of Youth Declaration

10 June 2024 Dushanbe, Tajikistan

Preamble

This "Parliamentarians' Forum on ICPD30: Sustainable Water Resources and Demographic Resilience for the Interest of Youth" was hosted in Dushanbe, Republic of Tajikistan, on 10 June 2024. The meeting was co-organized by the Parliament of Tajikistan (Majlisi Namoyandagon of the Majlisi Oli of the Republic of Tajikistan), Asian Forum of Parliamentarians on Population and Development (AFPPD) and the Asian Population and Development Association (APDA), with support from the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) through the Japan Trust Fund (JTF).

The meeting brought together more than 450 participants from parliaments, governments, international organizations, youth organizations and academia, involving 15 countries, to share and discuss good practices in policies, legislation and programmes on demographic shifts, aiming to address gender equality, investing in youth, water scarcity and climate change. It focused on policies, systems, and services that could strengthen investment in youth and eliminate gender inequality, including through empowering women and girls and engaging young people in decision-making processes.

Statement of Commitment

In line with our role as parliamentarians, we:

- A) Reaffirm our commitment to the Programme of Action of the International Conference on Population and Development (ICPD) and the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development as pathways to achieve an equitable future for all;
- B) Advocate for governments to use population data and analysis, including disaggregated data, to analyze, anticipate and adapt to demographic changes, to design evidence-based solutions tailored to specific national contexts in order to ensure demographic resilience. Whether in high or low fertility contexts, experience around the world has shown that solutions work best when they are people-centered, human capital-oriented and expand people's choices;
- C) Commit to building resilient individuals, communities and societies, and investing in emergency preparedness, anticipatory actions, and targeted disaster risk reduction plans. This includes prioritizing the protection of women, girls and adolescents, migrants, minorities and refugees in all their diversity in all ages, and other groups in vulnerable and marginalized situations during emergencies, including those relating to climate change. We actively support youth leadership in promoting peace, conflict prevention and in humanitarian action;

- D) Recall that 'leaving no one behind' is the key principle of the SDGs, and that more resilient and sustainable health systems, as part of ensuring universal health coverage, are critical to achieving the SDGs and a key element of addressing demographic challenges;
- E) Highlight the importance of promoting women's empowerment, including by increasing women's access to employment and services, addressing unpaid care work, and ensuring that policies address and redress gender inequalities;
- F) Work with national parliaments to address harmful social and gender norms that limit the potential of women, girls and adolescents in all their diversity, and other groups in vulnerable and marginalized situations, including through strengthened engagement of men and boys and the mobilization of community activists, faith-based organizations, and traditional and religious leaders;
- G) Highlight the importance of young people's empowerment and participation by ensuring the development and strengthening of public policies to accelerate human capital investments supporting young people to attain their highest potential through access to education and decent work and social safety packages;
- H) Promote enabling environments that eliminate discrimination against young people and empowers them to make informed decisions about their lives and bodies;
- I) Recognize the invaluable contributions of young people, women and girls to address the impact of climate change, and the need to leverage their experiences in disaster recovery and climate strategies keeping in mind that young people, in particular girls, are vulnerable to being disproportionately affected by climate change;
- J) Reaffirm that we parliamentarians and policymakers must pay careful attention to the needs and rights of all people, including women and young people everywhere, especially in disaster zones;
- K) Take affirmative action to develop a model or common legislation that places solidarity with the young people at the center with respect to their rights;
- L) Recommit to working with all stakeholders, including development partners: civil society; local, national, and regional governments; the private sector; multilateral organizations; national parliamentary bodies and regional and global fora on population and development; to implement the ICPD Programme of Action and the 2030 Agenda;

Our pledge

We, parliamentarians from different countries gathered in Dushanbe, pledge to:

- Advance legislative action: Develop and expand the legislative and policy framework for strengthening demographic resilience to the target climate changes, that is comprehensive, based on evidence, and centered on people and their rights and needs
- Support gender equality and youth empowerment: Support for the initiatives that empower women and young people and promote gender equality as part of efforts to build human capital and foster inclusion as key elements of demographic resilience strategies
- Enhance Climate and Water Resilience: Collaborate on developing policies and strategies to address climate change and water scarcity, leveraging the contributions of young people in resilience-building efforts.

These commitments will help achieve the ICPD Programme of Action and the Sustainable Development Goals, fostering a resilient and equitable future.
