Sustainable Water Resources and Demographic Resilience for the Interest of Youth**

Summary

Parliamentarians face an increasingly complex world in which to deliver on their mandates. Emerging megatrends continue to reshape societies in complex ways, making a rigorous legislative process all the more important for effective, evidence-based legislative process. Given that many of these challenges are regional or global in scope, inter-parliamentary dialogue has become not only appropriate but essential in formulating sustainable policy solutions.

In this context, more than 450 participants from 15 countries gathered in Dushanbe, Tajikistan, from June 10-11, 2024, to advance dialogue on environmental and demographic issues across Asia and Eastern Europe. This unique forum brought together parliamentarians, dignitaries, representatives of international organizations, and subject matter experts to share experiences, exchange ideas, and strengthen a dynamic network for collaboration.

Parliaments' forum was held as part of an ongoing series made possible by the generous support of the Japan Trust Fund (JTF) by the Government of Japan, a reliable partner with AFPPD for over 24 years. The active involvement and mobilization of the host parliament, the Majlisi Namoyandagon of the Majlisi Oli of Tajikistan, further highlighted the national prioritization and value placed on the issues discussed.

Thematic Coverage

The central theme unifying all sessions was the sustainable utilization of both natural and human resources. Discussion of these themes repeatedly underscored how conservation of natural resources and human capital are tightly interrelated, affecting society's capacity for development, mitigating and adapting to environmental change, and providing conditions for a high quality of life.

Four substantive sessions placed specific focus on youth and women as important populations requiring policy attention for the specific challenges they face. Beyond their inherent importance, supporting these groups unlocks significant potential for economic development and social welfare. Creating enable environment for young people and women not only promotes equity but also enhances national prosperity.

Inspiration

This meeting drew inspiration from a major milestone in population policy: ICPD30. This event commemorated the 30th anniversary of the 1994 International Conference on Population and Development (ICPD) in Cairo, Egypt, where 179 governments endorsed a rights-based, people-centered approach through the Programme of Action. While demographic trends and human capital increasingly grab the attention of parliamentarians, addressing the challenges with right-based measures remains the standard by which solutions can be found. The meeting carried forward such approaches to meet demographic needs, regardless of where in the *Demographic Transition* a country finds itself.

The Parliamentarians' forum was also held in parallel with and inspired by the *3rd Du3rd High Level Water Conference*, which emphasized sustainable water resource management. Tajikistan, as a water-rich country, has become a champion in this area after hosting multiple international water-related initiatives and domestic legislative actions. Ensuring water security, with all its economic, social, and demographic implications, is increasingly recognized as a shared priority across Central Asia. At a global level, Tajikistan and the UN recently led the designation of 2025 as the International Year of Glaciers' Preservation and setting March 21 as an annual World Day for Glaciers. It was incorporated

such themes since they directly connect to long-standing commitments to further SDGs and access to water is essentially a precondition to achieving any of the other SDGs.

Visibility and Impact

While the meeting effects will continue to unfold, it has already yielded tangible outcomes. A joint declaration was adopted a statement on 12 key priorities as well as a pledge for participants to pursue in their respective parliaments. The declaration emphasized the need to strengthen resilience in the face of demographic and environmental change.

The conference's success went beyond the event itself. It attracted significant media attention and influencing the outcome document of the *3rd High Level Water Conference*, a major gathering held in the proceeding days. Specifically, the outcome document highlighted three central messages originating from the forum: (1) empowerment of women and girls, (2) the vital role of parliamentarians and youth, and (3) the importance of inclusive policies that actively involve women and youth.

Substantive Sessions: Overview and Takeaways

The conference consists of four substantive sessions (see Appendix 1 for the detailed program), covering the overarching theme of sustainably cultivating natural resources and human potential, from different perspectives. The following synthesizes the four sessions' speeches and discussions, which were held in Tajik, English, and Russian.

Session 1 | Regional Perspectives on ICPD30 and Climate Change

The first session provided a comprehensive overview of demographic, social, and environmental trends in the UNECE region. Notable trends included delayed childbearing and declining fertility, alongside persistent challenge in reproductive health and the reconciliation of work-family responsibilities. In this complex demographic context, climate change was identified as an exacerbating factor, intensifying existing challenges. Participants heard that global average temperatures are projected to reach 1.5 °C above pre-industrial levels in the near future—and possibly 2.5–3 °C by century's end—surpassing critical ecological thresholds. These changes are already visibly affecting ecosystems and, consequently, economic systems.

Speakers repeatedly underscored the intergenerational nature of climate change. Young people, in particular, will bear a disproportionate burden of its impacts and must therefore be actively included in policy dialogues on mitigation and adaptation. The Y-PEER initiative was cited as an effective example of a youth-focused programme addressing both environmental and youth issues through localized and context-specific approaches. Additionally, successful youth-led initiatives cannot solely rely on the volunteering model as a substitute for workers, otherwise young people are put at risk of burnout and being stretched too thin between studies, work, and other commitments.

Country Example: Tajikistan | National Strategy on Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) 2019-2034

In accordance with the UN framework, Tajikistan has adopted its DDR strategy with four main objectives: 1) to reduce the number of deaths and injuries caused by natural disasters, 2) to enhance stakeholders' awareness, 3) to integrate disaster management into broader development planning, and 4) to improve disaster response mechanisms. In a shift, the policy has transformed its approach from reactive to proactive, as well as integrated the private sector into the policy-making process.

Looking ahead, the COP29 conference, to be hosted by Azerbaijan from 11-22 November, 2024, was highlighted as a critical opportunity to advance environmentally conscious policy. It was even referred

to as the most important global policy event of 2024. Parliamentarians were therefore encouraged to utilize the event as an occasion to show leadership in sustainable natural resources management and to prepare ambitious policy contributions in the lead-up to COP29.

Key Takeaways

Session 2 | Harnessing the Power of Youth: Addressing Megatrends and Shaping Demographic Resilience in the Region

Building on the discussions in Session 1, Session 2 placed youth at the center of conversation. Speakers repeatedly emphasized the connection between youth, creativity, and the capacity to challenge established norms. Young people were described as having a longer-term outlook and a personal stake in future developments, leading to a strong motivation for action and innovation.

One key demographic addressed was NEETs—youth Not in Education, Employment, or Training—who present an important policy target group. Participants heard how in a very short time (the past 6 years), Uzbekistan has demonstrated an impressive quadrupling of its students enrolled in higher education institutions.

Country Example: Uzbekistan | Strategy for Youth Development

Five initiatives are being implemented to develop youth potential: 1) arts education, 2) physical health with sports, 3) technological skill-building, 4) spirituality and knowledge (especially reading), and 5) the employment of women. Such a comprehensive approach recognizes the social, economic, and cultural value young people contribute to national development.

Midway through the session, a video from the recent *Global Youth Dialogue* in Cotonou, Benin, was screened. Several speakers had attended the event and described it as a valuable platform for young people to engage policy dialogue. One of the main takeaways was the desire of young people to contribute meaningfully to decision-making, including within parliamentary bodies.

Speakers also raised the recurring challenge of ‘brain drain’, or the loss of human capital. In Eastern Europe, many of the youth have gone to Western Europe and in Central Asia, many to Russia, representing lost investments in education and talent. However, the return of IT professionals to Bosnia and Herzegovina was cited as a positive reversal trend, showing it is possible for high out-migration countries to see a return of professionals from the diaspora and a better retention of talent. An open question was posed for parliamentarians to consider: is your education system preparing today’s youth for jobs in the next 5-10 years?

Country Example: Georgia | Parliament Actions to Strengthen Internships for Youth

To address the gap between education and the labor market, Georgia’s parliament has strengthened opportunities for young people by obliging state institutions to offer internships, which will benefit young people. These internships are designed to: 1) offer income, 2) deliver practical experience, and

3) come with formal recognition of public service by the state. Internships in deficient professions – subject to annual review – are further incentivized with double the pay.

Overall, Session 2 concluded that the common objective that policymakers should aim to build stable, high-quality socio-cultural systems that keep youth actively engaged. Furthermore, education and employment policy for young people should be treated as an integrated sector, not separate domains. Offering youth appeal prospects for launching into their adulthood was seen as an essential condition to reducing brain drain and enhance social cohesion.

Key Takeaways

- Incentivize education systems with future job markets by co-developing curricula and internship programs with employers.

Session 3 | Empowering Women for Resilient Societies: Bridging Gaps, Breaking Norms

Session 3 addressed the systemic challenges faced by women and the gender disparities that continue to impede their full participation in society. Topics ranged from employment barriers to personal safety, with speakers advocating for gender-responsive policymaking as a tool to dismantle structural inequalities.

A central concern raised was the disproportionately burden of unpaid care work that fall on women. Estimates presented ranged from 2 to 2.5 times more unpaid work than men. For instance, in Bosnia and Herzegovina, women perform an estimated 6 hours of unpaid care work daily, while in the EU the average is approximately 3.5 hours. Such responsibilities often include childcare, eldercare, and household duties—frequently in addition to formal employment. Speakers called on parliamentarians to promote more equitable sharing of care responsibilities within households and to support affordable, high-quality care infrastructure.

Access to paid maternity leaves remains unattainable for women in many countries. However, more countries are providing support, such as Turkmenistan, which now provides job protection and paid leave to mothers until their child reaches age 3. Removing barriers that prevent women from entering or re-entering the workforce after childbirth was highlighted as beneficial not only to individual women but to national economies as a whole.

Country Example: Bosnia and Herzegovina | Training Unemployed Mothers

In Bosnia and Herzegovina, DM Drogerie Markt, in collaboration with UNFPA, the Mozaik Foundation, and the Czech Government, established a programme to support unemployed mothers in acquiring practical skills. The initiative offers paid work experience with flexible working hours, enabling participants to better balance employment with caregiving. This project was cited as proof of concept, demonstrating the benefits of employer-driven flexibility in workplace practices.

The forum's host, Tajikistan, highlighted national efforts to elevate the role of women in society. In keeping with the ratification of key international conventions, the country has established goals for women to make up 30% of civil servants and 25% of political leaders by 2030. Combatting sexual

harassment has been a particularly high priority, strict enforcement across administrative levels, and the establishment of 29 domestic violence centers nationwide.

Speakers emphasized the need for robust policy action to address violence against women. Effective legislation should incentivize prompt and competent responses from authorities, while fostering a safe environment in which victims empowered to report crimes. In addition to physical and sexual violence, emerging threats in the digital space were noted as pressing concerns. Participants called for urgent legislative inquiry to define and enforce protections against such abuses.

The session concluded with the reminder that meaningful progress on gender equality does not occur by chance, but through deliberate legislative action. The wide-ranging issues brought up by the speakers including unpaid care work, unemployment, political participation, and gender-based violence, underscored how legislation can have both direct and indirect impacts on women's lives.

Key Takeaways

Session 4 | The Parliamentarians' Role in Advancing the ICPD and 2030 Agendas

The final session broadened its scope to objectives of the ICPD and 2030 agendas, exploring opportunities for parliamentarians to make progress in their respective countries, from youth to the elderly. The session emphasized the need to create inclusive societies where all individuals can lead healthy, productive, and fulfilling lives.

One example shared was from Armenia, where the legal age for certain civic rights has been lowered to 12, reflecting an intention to better incorporate youth more fully into society. Armenia has implemented a comprehensive package of youth measures covering civic education, healthy living, national identity, career orientation, volunteerism, and both financial and digital literacy. These programmes contribute to the ICPD and 2030 agenda by equipping young people with the skills and knowledge necessary to realize their ability to pursue their aspirations.

At the other end of the demographic spectrum, the event addressed the welfare of older persons. Participants stressed that the label "elderly" should not be treated as a homogeneous category. Specifically, there is an important distinction between young and old pensioners, the former of which typically require minimal or no support and can still actively contribute to their communities. Pensioners were said to have much to offer both in terms of part-time employment (where legislation and employers do not set up barriers), as well as for their volunteering in the community.

Country Example: Belarus | *Granny's Tales & Silver Job Placement Fairs*

In Belarus, volunteer grandmothers have been paired with children experiencing speech difficulties to read stories together, promoting child development and alleviating social isolation among seniors. In addition, "Silver" job placement fairs match older individuals with part-time employment opportunities. Both programmes provide meaningful social and economic engagement for the elderly,

promoting integrational cohesion and well-being. The session reiterated that involvement of stakeholders is a precondition for advancing the ICPD and 2030 agendas. Investing in human capital – in addition to being an explicit development goal in the ICPD and SDGs – was said to also be a force for leveling out some of the more extreme disparities existing within populations. Lastly, participants agreed that sustained inter-parliamentary dialogue, such as that demonstrated in the meeting, remains crucial for exchanging best practices to achieve sustainable development.

Key Takeaways

Forum Declaration

As a culmination of the broad policy exchanges held throughout the substantive discussions, this meeting moved to make the shared sentiments tangible by producing a joint outcome document. This declaration outlined 12 actionable commitments, reflecting the shared priorities and collective vision of the participants.

The declaration was adopted following a brief discussion, with no objections or substantial amendments, underscoring the foundational nature of these ‘statements of commitment’. Many of the points were intended to reaffirm the core tenants of ICPD30, emphasizing a rights-based, inclusive, and people-centered approach to development. BACKGROUND

The 30-year review of implementation of the International Conference on Population and Development [Programme of Action](#) (ICPD30) is underway across several platforms, including a wide cross-section of actors and types of events. In the last 30 years, significant progress has been made, but progress is threatened by multifaceted crises, backsliding on the rights and choices of women and girls, and the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. While there is progressive activism for social justice, climate action and equality, we are at a critical inflection point to preserve the hard-won gains and deliver on the vision of the ICPD agenda and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) – the historic set of goals adopted by world leaders in 2015 to eliminate poverty, achieve gender equality and secure the health and well-being of all people. As we approach the 30th anniversary of the ICPD, there's a chance to revitalize the agenda centered on human rights and sustainable development.

International Parliamentarians' Forum on ICPD30 will explore how at this 30-year anniversary, the core values of the ICPD Programme of Action remain a beacon for advancing sustainable development with a focus on human rights, including reproductive rights, empowerment of women and young people and addressing inequalities. The event will also provide parliamentarians, who are at the very core of the legislative process, with an opportunity to share good practices and advocate for coordinated regional efforts towards achieving the ICPD goals. The meeting will discuss issues related to demographic shifts, gender equality, young people's empowerment, water scarcity and climate change and form a milestone on the way to the UN Climate Change Conference (COP29) in Baku in November 2024.

International Parliamentarians' Forum on ICPD30 will be held at the margins of the [Third Dushanbe Water Action Decade Conference](#), hosted by the Government of the Republic of Tajikistan in cooperation with the United Nations to support the implementation of the goals of the International Decade for Action "Water for Sustainable Development" 2018-2028. The participants of the International Parliamentarians' Forum on ICPD30 will attend the opening ceremony of the Water Action Decade Conference.

OBJECTIVES

- To promote dialogue among parliamentarians, government representatives, civil society, the private sector, and academia from Central Asia and Eastern Europe on the implementation of the ICPD Programme of Action and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) with a view to achieving commitment to collective action in the creation of an enabling policy environment and increasing investments in advancing ICPD agenda implementation.
- To discuss barriers to women's empowerment and gender equality and propose solutions to the realization of women's full potential, including through gender-responsive family policies.
- To discuss the role of young people in the context of demographic resilience in Eastern Europe and Central Asia, and how best to reflect their rights and aspirations in policy and national commitments, including their participation in decision-making fora.
- To leverage on ICPD30 outcomes to strengthen partnerships and advance the UN Water Conference's Water Action Agenda, accelerating progress on 2030 Sustainable Development Agenda.

EXPECTED OUTCOMES

- Statement of Commitment outlining concrete actions to be taken by parliamentarians to prioritize demographic resilience, gender equality, youth empowerment, water security and climate action for achieving both the ICPD agenda and the SDGs.
- Expanded network of parliamentarians championing action towards the implementation of ICPD agenda and achievement of the SDGs.
- Deeper understanding among parliamentarians of the complex interplay between demographic resilience, gender equality, youth empowerment, water scarcity and climate change.

Appendix 2: Declaration

International Parliamentarians' Forum on ICPD30: Sustainable Water Resources and Demographic Resilience for the Interest of Youth Declaration

10 June 2024
Dushanbe, Tajikistan

Preamble

The Parliamentarians' Forum on ICPD30: Sustainable Water Resources and Demographic Resilience for the Interest of Youth was hosted in Dushanbe, Republic of Tajikistan, on 10 June 2024. The meeting was co-organized by the Parliament of Tajikistan (Majlisi Namoyandagon of the Majlisi Oli), the Asian Forum of Parliamentarians on Population and Development (AFPPD) and the Asian Population and Development Association (APDA), with support from the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) through the Japan Trust Fund (JTF).

The meeting brought together over 450 participants from 15 countries, including members of parliament, government officials, representatives of international organizations, youth organizations, and academia. Participants shared and discussed good practices in policy, legislation, and programmes designed to address demographic shifts, gender equality, investment in youth, water scarcity, and climate change. Special emphasis was placed on advancing policies, systems, and services that strengthen investment in youth and eliminate gender inequality, particularly through the empowerment of women and girls and the meaningful engagement of young people in decision-making processes.

Statement of Commitment

In alignment with our role as parliamentarians, we hereby declare the following:

- A) Reaffirm our commitment to the Programme of Action of the International Conference on Population and Development (ICPD) and the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development as pathways to achieve an equitable future for all;
- B) Advocate for governments to use population data and analysis, including disaggregated data, to analyze, anticipate and adapt to demographic changes, to design evidence-based solutions tailored to specific national contexts in order to ensure demographic resilience. Whether in high or low fertility contexts, experience around the world has shown that solutions work best when they are people-centered, human capital-oriented and expand people's choices;
- C) Commit to building resilient individuals, communities and societies, and investing in emergency preparedness, anticipatory actions, and targeted disaster risk reduction plans. This includes prioritizing the protection of women, girls and adolescents, migrants, minorities and refugees in all their diversity in all ages, and other groups in vulnerable and marginalized situations during emergencies, including those relating to climate change. We actively support youth leadership in promoting peace, conflict prevention and in humanitarian action;
- D) Recall that 'leaving no one behind' is the key principle of the SDGs, and that more resilient and sustainable health systems, as part of ensuring universal health coverage, are critical to achieving the SDGs and a key element of addressing demographic challenges;
- E) Highlight the importance of promoting women's empowerment, including by increasing women's access to employment and services, addressing unpaid care work, and ensuring that policies address and redress gender inequalities;
- F) Work with national parliaments to address harmful social and gender norms that limit the potential of women, girls and adolescents in all their diversity, and other groups in vulnerable and marginalized situations, including through strengthened engagement of men and boys and the mobilization of community activists, faith-based organizations, and traditional and religious leaders;

- G) Highlight the importance of young people's empowerment and participation by ensuring the development and strengthening of public policies to accelerate human capital investments supporting young people to attain their highest potential through access to education and decent work and social safety packages;
- H) Promote enabling environments that eliminate discrimination against young people and empowers them to make informed decisions about their lives and bodies;
- I) Recognize the invaluable contributions of young people, women and girls to address the impact of climate change, and the need to leverage their experiences in disaster recovery and climate strategies keeping in mind that young people, in particular girls, are vulnerable to being disproportionately affected by climate change;
- J) Reaffirm that we parliamentarians and policymakers must pay careful attention to the needs and rights of all people, including women and young people everywhere, especially in disaster zones;
- K) Take affirmative action to develop a model or common legislation that places solidarity with the young people at the center with respect to their rights;
- L) Recommit to working with all stakeholders, including development partners: civil society; local, national, and regional governments; the private sector; multilateral organizations; national parliamentary bodies and regional and global fora on population and development; to implement the ICPD Programme of Action and the 2030 Agenda;

Our pledge

We, parliamentarians from different countries gathered in Dushanbe, pledge to:

- **Advance legislative action:** Develop and expand the legislative and policy framework for strengthening demographic resilience to the target climate changes, that is comprehensive, based on evidence, and centered on people and their rights and needs
- **Support gender equality and youth empowerment:** Support for the initiatives that empower women and young people and promote gender equality as part of efforts to build human capital and foster inclusion as key elements of demographic resilience strategies
- **Enhance Climate and Water Resilience:** Collaborate on developing policies and strategies to address climate change and water scarcity, leveraging the contributions of young people in resilience-building efforts.

These commitments will help achieve the ICPD Programme of Action and the Sustainable Development Goals, fostering a resilient and equitable future.
